



#### **ARRT Offers**

Our Western Rother project has funds to enhance water quality and habitats for fish and other species. The following offers are available to landowners.

#### **Riverbank Trees**

Rivers need shade to keep temperatures low for fish and other species—with increased temperatures and tree diseases predicted we need to act now.

We are looking for river banks that would benefit from tree planting, for example where trees have been lost to disease or where erosion is taking place. Supported by the Woodland Trust, trees are native species from native grown stock and supplied guards and stakes. We can even help with planting them.

#### **River Enhancements**

Some areas of the Rother lack habitats for fish and other species, such as vegetation or a range of flow types. We have funds to help restore river habitats using natural materials. If your stretch is missing deep and shallow sections, plants in the water, has undercut banks and tree roots, then get in touch.

## **Catchment Sensitive Farming**

Catchment Sensitive Farming (CSF) is a project run by Natural England in partnership with the Environment Agency and the DEFRA. It's staffed by trained, qualified and experienced advisors. Catchment Sensitive Farming Officers work with independent specialists from the farming community to deliver free advice tailored to the area and farming sector. This advice includes workshops, farm events and individual farm appraisals. CSF also offer capital grants, at up to 60% of the total funding, to deliver improvements in farm infrastructure.
