New focus on ammonia

Since 2006 the Catchment Sensitive Farming Team has worked with over 20,000 farms across England on reducing water pollution from agriculture. CSF is now expanding its work to include good ammonia management. Our offer will remain simple – providing bespoke advice to farmers to improve practices and reduce running costs.



Code of Good Agricultural Practice launched for ammonia emissions

Slug control

Slug pellet application season is around the corner and moderate-to-high slug pressure is anticipated for the season, especially following this year's cracked soils which provide refugia for slugs.

An article in South East Farmer - available at <http://bit.ly/SEFarmer-slugs-03092018> - recommends that growers adopt a risk-based Integrated Pest Management approach, including controlling slugs using several different techniques. Metaldehyde-based pellets pose a risk to drinking water quality. If you use them, please ensure you adhere to the **Metaldehyde Stewardship Guidelines**, which set out best practice for their use. These are available at <http://bit.ly/metaldehydeguidelines>

Pellets containing ferric phosphate are a very effective alternative to metaldehyde-based pellets. Southern Water is subsidising ferric phosphate pellets, slug pelletter calibration and PA1 and PA4s training. Contact your local CSFO to find out more about these financial incentives.



Soils

Dry weather this summer caused widespread cracking. When rain falls, these cracks fast-track the flow of pesticides or nutrients dissolved in runoff from the field to watercourses. Please be mindful of this when you make pesticide or fertiliser applications whilst soils are cracked. OSR herbicides campaign

Five herbicides critical to weed control and growing a successful oilseed rape crop - metazachlor, propyzamide, carbetamide, quinmerac and clopyralid - are increasingly being detected in surface water. OSR Herbicides? Think Water

Manage tramlines, pathways and gateways to minimise compaction and reduce the risk of surface water run-off

Ensure all surface water adjacent to OSR fields is protected by at least a 6m vegetative buffer strip

Grants

The RDPE **Countryside Productivity Scheme** has two funding streams available to farmers, providing 40% of eligible costs – details at <http://bit.ly/CPSgrants>

- The **Improving Farm Productivity** scheme offers grants of £35,000 or more to support investment for more efficient use of livestock slurries, manures and digestate (deadline: 3rd December).
- The **Small Grant Scheme**, expected to re-open in autumn, offers grants of £3,000-£12,000 for equipment to improve farm productivity such as GPS for precision farming, yield mapping equipment, trailing shoe, cattle and sheep handling equipment.

Funding to improve water quality is also available through **Countryside Stewardship**. Get ahead by getting in touch with your local CSFO this winter to discuss which options are best for your farm business – specialist advice is available.

Local news

Farm Manager David Hamilton Fox aims to solve soil erosion problems on the vulnerable greensand soils at the **Cowdray Estate**. He has adopted a seven-point sustainability plan that provides the framework for all farming activities carried out on the 1,370ha mixed dairy and arable farm in the South Downs National Park. The plan includes practices such as no-till establishment, cover crops and grass waterways to help keep soils in place and improve soil health and structure.
